<b>Learning Objectives</b>
Rising educators will be able to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Create a working definition of curriculum including the key layers and components of curriculum.</li> </ul>
<b>Essential Questions</b>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• What is curriculum?</li> </ul>
<b>Lesson Title &amp; Overview</b>
<p><b>Day 1: What Is Curriculum?</b></p> <p>Rising educators will explore what curriculum is in the broad sense and what its layers and components include.</p> <p>Preview the resources for this lesson <a href="#">here</a>.</p>
<b>Procedure</b>
<p><b>Day 1:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• (10 minutes) Open the lesson by having rising educators respond to the question: How do schools decide what you should learn? Record their responses on chart paper. As the lesson continues, have them return to these original thoughts for confirmation and/or to adjust any misconceptions they may have.</li> <li>• (35 minutes) Create a visual of curriculum: The teacher leader should determine how to facilitate this section depending on the class. The class can be divided into three groups (each reading a different article), rising educators could self-select an article to read or the class could all read the same article. Either way, the goal is for rising educators to create a visual to help them define curriculum including the key components. (See the appendix for an example.) Ensure time after reading and working for sharing and comparing. There are three similar yet distinct readings to support this work: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Larry Cuban's <a href="#">"The Multilayered Curriculum"</a></li> <li>○ Tom Vander Ark's <a href="#">"What is Curriculum?"</a></li> <li>○ UNESCO's <a href="#">"Different Meanings of 'Curriculum'"</a> (this is the shortest article).</li> </ul> </li> <li>• (Five minutes) <b>Formative assessment:</b> Ask rising educators to write a definition of curriculum and turn it in before leaving. Teacher leader: Use this exit ticket to assess understanding and clarify, as needed.</li> </ul> <p><i>Extension/challenge</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Ask rising educators to read the other article(s) from class.</li> </ul>
